That allows me to continue being his

mother even though he is not here. I know certainly that contacting Sands as a bereaved parent initially and now becoming an ambassador with them, it's those friendships that I formed through our combined grief, those friendships that hold me and carry me through these days without Shivai. I am grateful for that support I have received from Sands. So I want to take this moment to remind you that today and every day, you are not alone. There are so many people out there that have had the same experiences that you may have had and I want to remind you that we are all here to support and hold you. As we do this remembrance day and celebrate our little ones, I hope it brings you today and for the forthcoming days peace, love and harmony in remembering your little ones.

Hannukah is the 8-day Jewish festival of lights, which falls in December, the darkest time of year. For 8 days we gather together and light candles on a menorah. The candles light up the darkness, much as gathering together and sharing in our grief may help light up the darkness inside us.

Traditionally, we sing songs together, and I'd like to share the first verse and chorus of a song called *We Came to Drive Away the Darkness (Banu Choshech Le-Garesh)*.

Though the night is cold and dark.

bereavement, it's very easy to get stuck in the darkness because you think, 'Why should I come out? I'm hurting, I'm in pain.' I understand that. I went there as well. But sometimes if you just have a little flicker of hope, you realise that actually, coming out is better than staying in. You can reach so many more people, hear from so many people. And maybe not today, maybe not tomorrow because it takes time but one day, you could be light for someone else. I want to read this from the book of Matthew, chapter 5 verse 14-16.

You are the light of the world. A city built on a mountain cannot be hidden. No-one lights a lamp and covers it. Instead, it is put on a lampstand where it gives light to everyone in the house. In the same way, your light must shine before others so they may see the good you do and praise your Father in Heaven.

We find ourselves in difficult times, often feeling that bad news, isolation; loneliness and grief are all around us. The same was true for those in the land of Judah around the year 700 BC. The people were walking in darkness, separated from their loved ones, anxious about their immediate and long-term futures. But the prophet Isiah brought

an important message of comfort to the people, foreseeing the coming of the promised Messiah and sharing words of light, peace and hope to those who would listen. It's in Isiah chapter 9 verses 1-3 and 6-7.

For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. Of the increase of his government and peace there will be no end. He will reign on David's throne and over his kingdom, establishing and upholding it with justice and righteousness from that time on and forever. The zeal of the Lord Almighty will accomplish this.

So may this same light, peace and hope shine in our hearts and be with us and our families this Christmas.
